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

Rise to the Top:

MUIC INAUGURATES NEW BUILDING



Royal Presence

he 26th of March this year was indeed a very special day for Mahidol University International College (MUIC). Its newest building was inaugurated that day, the highlight of MUIC's 31st anniversary celebration. Not only that, one of the College's distinguished alumni presided over the ceremony: Her Royal Highness Princess Aditayathorn Mahidol, after whom the building was named.

In the presence of Mahidol University and MUIC executives, faculty members, staff and students, along with civilian, military and police leaders of Nakhon Pathom province, the ceremony began with the Princess performing Buddhist rites. After presentations by Assoc. Prof. Phitaya Charupoonphol, MUIC Dean, and Clinical Prof.

Udom Kachintorn, M.D., President of Mahidol University, the Princess proceeded to a dais and unveiled the signboard bearing the name of the new building. Afterwards, Her Royal Highness presented an offering to the monks.

In recognition of the Princess' achievements, the Mahidol Alumni Association presented to her the Mahidol Thayakorn Award, one that is given to the university's outstanding alumni.

Following this, Dean Phitaya presented to the Princess the outstanding alumni of MUIC from 2015 and 2016. They received memorial pins from Her Royal Highness.

The MUIC Dean then announced the establishment

of the Princess Aditayathorn Mahidol Foundation, which includes 166 scholars from MUIC. Mr. Michael Naglis, Associate Dean for Student Affairs, received the memorial pin on their behalf.

As a token of appreciation for their support, MUIC's 49 patrons received memorial pins from Her Royal Highness. Prof. Emeritus Dr. Serene Pibooniyom, MUIC's first Director, presented her group's cash donation for Her Royal Highness' charity work.


The Princess planted a purple "Rachavadee" (Butterfly Bush/Summer Lilac), after which she went inside Aditayathorn Building to view the exhibition. Her Royal Highness then signed her name on the new building's plaque, officially concluding the inauguration process.



Center of Learning

ne of the first things that would strike a visitor to Aditayathorn Building is its modern influences the clean and simple lines girding the concrete-and-glass square building. A professor from the Fine and Applied Arts Division even said that its design is comparable to the Bauhaus, the famous German art and design school that promotes modern creative thinking. Indeed, Aditayathorn Building's architect, Mr. Chatree Ladalalitsakun of Tonsilp Studio Co. Ltd., describes the design as "Thai Modern Style," explaining that he fused Modern Art elements with tropical design. The latter, he said, is aimed at assuring a good quality of life for both students and staff through environmental-friendly designs highlighted by Aditayathorn Building's green court, the open space on the second floor of the







Other green features of Aditayathorn Building include shady trees in the building's perimeter, a combination of energy-efficient air-conditioners and natural ventilation, energy-efficient lighting system, renewable energy use, water-saving sanitation system, waste segregation and recycling facility, among others. And because the Ministry of Energy found that Aditayathorn Building saves 60% energy compared to other building design entries, it bestowed upon the new building the "Energy Efficiency Building Design Award for New Building" in November 2016.

The new building is easily accessible via the Salaya campus' Gate 2. It is six stories high with three levels of underground parking facilities. With Aditayathorn Building's total area of 67,901 sq.m., students are provided with more than enough space for learning. Upon entering the building, one would be met by a cavernous yet light and

airy study hall. Around 2,000 students can be accommodated inside the new structure, which has 30 classrooms, seven computer laboratories, 47 laboratories, and three studios including a screening room. It also has 10 meeting rooms and 81 faculty offices, and, for additional amenities, there are eight restaurants, four canteens, a convenience store, a fitness center, plus about 500 parking spaces.

Aditayathorn Building's opening marks a new milestone as MUIC continues to offer international tertiary education. As Dean Phitaya noted, "As MUIC's center of learning, Aditayathorn Building will not only be a source of stability and sustainable development for the College but will also play a crucial role in offering more educational opportunities that will spur educational development."

HRH Princess Aditayathorn Mahidol: Education and Creativity at MUIC

Her Royal Highness Princess Aditayathorn Mahidol is the second daughter of Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn Walailak. After finishing her secondary education in the United States, she continued her studies in 2010 at Mahidol University International College's (MUIC) Communication Design program, a pioneering international program in the Kingdom. Praised by her mentors for her deep appreciation of her Thai heritage and also her international outlook, she received the Best Communication Design Thesis Award for her thesis "Redesign Packaging for Royal Chitralada Agricultural Products." Initially displayed at the Media Arts Exhibition at Bangkok Art and Culture Centre hosted by MUIC's Fine and Applied Arts Division on August 2-5, 2011, her thesis was also exhibited twice in Mahidol University which, on one occasion, was graced by the presence of Her Royal Highness Princess Sirindhorn. Royal Chitralada Agricultural Products is currently rebranding its merchandise using the Princess' designs. HRH Princess Aditayathorn graduated on July 4, 2011 and was inducted into the MUIC Alumni Association with special membership no. 0009 in reference to His Majesty the Late King Rama 9. She was also selected as one of the Outstanding Alumni Awardees for 2016 by the Mahidol University Alumni Association for her achievements. It is only fitting that the new building inspired by Modern Art will carry the name of HRH Princess Aditayathorn who herself is an accomplished design artist.
