Sweet Taste of Success

The recently held Food Innopolis Innovation Contest was meant to tap the talents of Thai students in coming up with new ways of presenting and packaging Thai food products.

Though this is the first time for the team of Ms. Thanatcha Vichienkalayarat and Ms. Kamolporn Ittisurasing, two Food Science and Technology students from Mahidol University International College (MUIC), to enter a contest, they handily beat 73 other teams from other universities all over Thailand with their entry called "Original Sensation," a rice pop and Thai chicken green curry spread they dubbed as "Dip the Dish."

Aside from the Grand Prize, they also bagged two other prizes, "Best Presentation Award" and 1st Prize in "Original Sensation Theme," earning them a total cash prize of 110,000 Baht.

Asked how they came up with their concoction, here is what they said: "The inspiration came from Western chips and dips. We would like to add more Thai-ness into it, so we used jasmine rice pop with Thai green curry spread."

Mover and Shaker

It was Ms. Rosemary Gosteli Dela Cruz's first time to attend a Model United Nations conference, and it proved to be a memorable experience. At the end of the UN4MUN Southeast Asia Conference 2018 held on January 17-20, 2018 at the Centara Grand and Bangkok Convention Center in Bangkok, she received the Diplomacy Award and the Best Position Paper Award based on her performance.

Ms. Dela Cruz, who majors in Intercultural Studies and Languages, was assigned to play the role of a delegate of China in the United Nations Security Council, representing China's views on some given issues. The activity's goal was to draft successfully a resolution as well as complete press elements, press statements, and a presidential statement.

She credited "all the group work we do in our classes. I can definitely say MUIC has helped in teaching me how to work well with people," she said.

The Peacemaker

Ms. Suthida Chang is a 3rd year student in the Intercultural Studies and Languages program specializing in the Ethics, Philosophy and Economics concentration (EPE) who always attends international student conferences whenever she has a chance.

At the 5th Model Asia-Europe Meeting (ASEM) Spinoff held in Singapore recently, Ms. Suthida received the Best Delegation Award for her distinguished diplomatic and conflict resolution skills. She was as well commended for having delivered the best intervention speech. She took on the role of head of the French delegation in the socio-cultural and educational pillar.

"The multi-disciplinary curriculum here in MUIC definitely exposes me to a wide range of topics that help me to build up a background for international relations and contemporary issues. The critical thinking skills that I gain from my program definitely also help me to analyze arguments and improve my rhetorical skills. Moreover, I believe that the exposure to the international community in MUIC — professors and exchange students — allows me to adapt to different environments to work with different people," she said.

Young Inventors

What better way to use IT than to solve environmental problems. And Mahidol University's "Invent for the Planet" contest tapped its talented students to come up with scientific solutions.

The "IC the Future" team comprising Ms. Suchanuch Piriyasatit and Ms. Suchanun Piriyasatit—twin sisters who are both taking up Computer Science—Ms. Wanutcha Lorpaiboon, a Chemistry major, and Ms. Arthitaya Rusmintratip, a Finance student, won the 1st Prize with its entry "WaterBout You." It is a computer app that measures water usage in buildings and households.

On the other hand, the "BIN48" team with Ms. Sawarin Sodsangsook and Mr. Pongsawut Naknual, who are both Computer Science students, won 2nd Prize for its entry "Remote Monitoring of Waste Build-up."

"The app we created monitors the water used in bathrooms, kitchens or the garden to know where water is being used the most. Then we compare each household to one another. We read a study that if households compare their water usage they would be more motivated to use less," Ms. Suchanuch from "IC the Future" team explained.

Asked what gave them the edge in the competition, "IC the Future" said, "We thought out of the box and did not stick to obvious solutions."

Going to Germany was not new to **Ms. Pakpitchaya Niyomsirivanich**, a senior Intercultural Studies and Languages student. "I was an exchange student in Germany for one year when I was in high school, and I saw this opportunity to go back there," she said.

So what made her come back? "I wanted to experience more international exposure and improve my German at the same time," she said.

Ms. Pakpitchaya chose to study in the University of Konstanz for five months, enrolling in several language and social science courses. As an exchange student she met "a diverse group of people, living in a beautiful city, doing things in different ways. All of these expand one's horizon, which is essential for working in a global environment."

What impressed Synno about the Germans were their waste segregation practices and sense of punctuality. "For example, in glass recycling, I was surprised to see not only one container for glasses. In fact, there were three types: colorless glass, green glass, and brown glass. Additionally, punctuality was very important for them."

For Ms. Daochula Prueksachattapaisal, a 23-year-old International Business major, chose to study in Mannheim University for seven months last year because it offered a good selection of business administration courses. The university is located in central Germany, a good starting place to explore the country and the continent.

Everyone in the university spoke English though Ms. Daochula still took a course in German language to help her in her everyday communication. Her German professors and classmates were also warm and supportive. "During my first week, there were several events that both German and international students attended. That's why I got to know my classmates before classes started."

The most memorable experience was sharing a flat with four other German students. "We had so many shared experiences like cooking, watching movies, going to parties, and doing sports together," she said.

"I learned how to adapt myself into a new environment, developed my self-confidence, and broadened my knowledge and skills in a top university. It was also the best opportunity to see the world. It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience," she said.

CHARINYARASAMI HALL

3rd Floor | Floor area: 299 sq.m.

At the heart of Aditayathorn Building is Charinyarasami Hall. It is situated in an island-like structure in the center of the new building's 3rd floor. Its name derived from a combination of the current MUIC Dean's name

and those of previous deans' and directors', Charinyarasami Hall is a multipurpose venue where various college events like meetings, ceremonies, and others can be held.

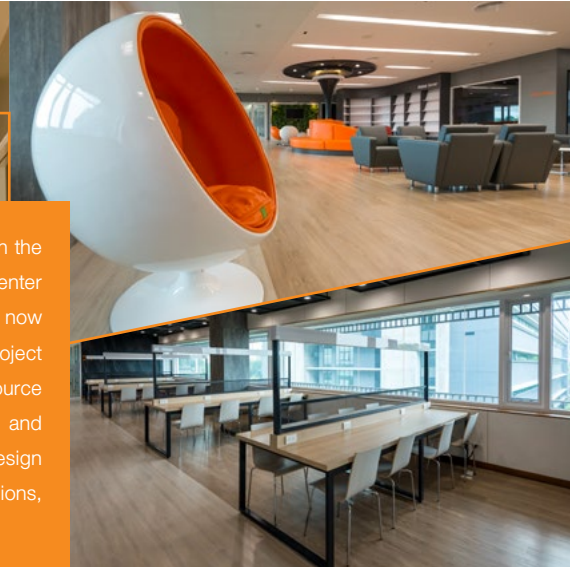


CO-WORKING SPACE

The Co-working Space is the newest place in the campus for researching, writing, and even chilling. The enormous floor area, divided into sectors like the Computer, Study, Relaxation, and Quiet zones, the Multipurpose Rooms, and Alumni Corner, assures every visitor that there is enough space for all.

With MUIC signing an MOU with the Thailand Creative and Design Center (TCDC), the Co-working Space now hosts TCDC's community project called mini-TCDC Link, a resource center that provides students and researchers access to online design databases and TCDC publications, among others.

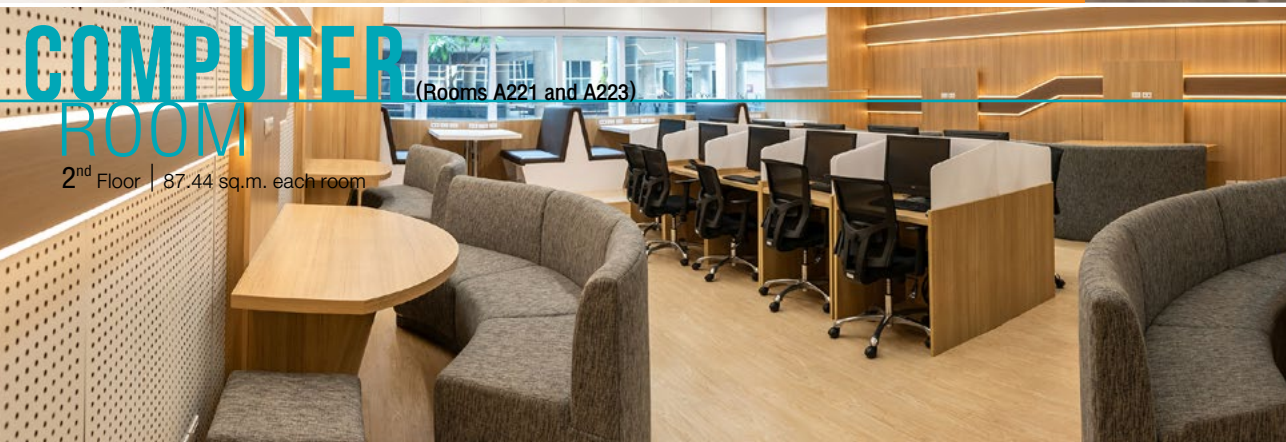


COMPUTER ROOM
