DELEGATES to ASEAN Youth Summit

Two MUIC students became the only representatives of Thailand to the ASEAN Youth Summit held in Manila, Philippines on April 24-28, 2017.

Ms. Suthida Chang (Inter-Cultural Studies and Languages) and Mr. Pawinpon Theerawong (Social Science) joined almost a hundred other student delegates from other ASEAN member-countries at the campus of host De La Salle University Manila for three days, learning more about the regional organization and its member-countries.

The two representatives, whose participation was sponsored by both Mahidol University and MUIC, made the most out of the three-day event by actively participating in the various activities. Mr. Pawinpon acted as the Prime Minister of Cambodia while Ms. Suthida was assigned as a member of the Malaysian cultural committee during the mock proceedings. They also had the opportunity to bond with their counterparts from the region, visit historical places in Manila, and get a taste of Filipino food.

International Seminar on Migration

In a milestone event, the Social Science Division of Mahidol University International College (MUIC) collaborated with the Institute of Human Rights and Peace Studies of Mahidol University and the United Nations Action for Cooperation Against Trafficking in Persons (UN-ACT) in organizing the International Seminar on Mixed Migration in Southeast and East Asia on June 21-22, 2017 at the Salaya Pavilion Hotel, MUIC.



Almost 30 research papers were presented by university researchers from the US, Europe, Australia and Asia and also officials from UN agencies and international organizations. There were also several panels of experts during the two-day seminar.

There were also a photo exhibition on the lives of migrant construction workers in Bangkok, Thailand entitled "Behind Tin Walls" at the lobby of Aditayathorn Building, and a presentation and demonstration of an educational board game on sexual trafficking in Nepal by two students from the Social Science Division of MUIC.



Seminar on IT and Small Business

Online media can indeed boost small businesses. This is the underlying principle behind the groundbreaking seminar-workshop "It's Time to Catch: A Digital Tool 2GO" that was hosted by Mahidol University International College (MUIC) on May 26, 2017 at Salaya Pavilion Hotel.

This seminar-workshop is a part of the ASEAN academic partnership for small business and ICT knowledge transfer, which is supported by the Australian government through the Australia-ASEAN Council of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. More than 40 participants, including lecturers, supporting staff, graduate students, and future entrepreneurs, attended the workshop.



The workshop began with a welcome speech by Assoc. Prof. Dr. Phitaya Charupoonphol, Dean of MUIC, followed by the introductory remarks by Ms. Octavia Borthwick, Deputy Head of Mission of the Australian Embassy in Thailand. Distinguished speakers included Mr. Korlarp Suwacharangkul, Strategy and New Services Manager of LINE Corp.; Mr. Bounthay Khammanyvong, Country Manager of Honestbee Thailand; Mr. Army Hinchiranan, Founder of Mother Trucker; Dr. Chanchai Phonthanukitithaworn and Asst. Prof. Yingyot Chiaravutthi, lecturers from MUIC; and Dr. Carmine Sellitto, senior lecturer from Victoria University.

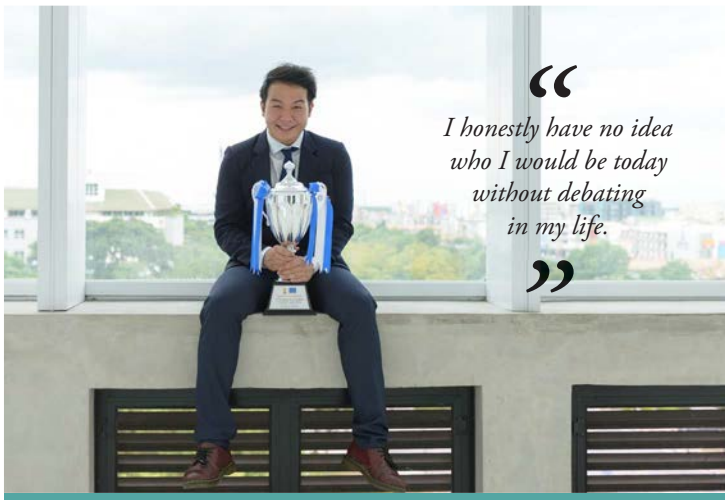
Assoc. Prof. Dr. Phitaya Charupoonphol, Dean of MUIC, led executives in formally welcoming the diplomat and his entourage.

championship of a prestigious tournament like the EU-TH is no walk in the park, especially if the pressure of a defending champion is added to the mix.

He explained that the Debate Club (which has around 20 members as of the 3rd Trimester of academic year 2016-17) under its trainer, Ms. Avianna Nahzneene Castaño, conducts six-hour sessions every week. The sessions are called a plenary which consists of lectures, sparring, and other activities. Ms. Castaño, a quarterfinalist in the World Universities Debating Championship 2015 among other international achievements, also holds one-on-one sessions with members in the areas of speech impediments, vocabulary building, and speaking style.

Once they start preparing for a major tournament, they ratchet up the training hours. Mr. Sae-Seah said they began researching about the debate topics a month before the

EU-TH contest. Two weeks before the event, they were doing the more intensive sparring sessions. And during the tournament itself, the three teams still rehearsed up to 3:00 a.m. Mr. Sae-Seah pointed out that "What matters more is how regularly we develop this skill. It is more often an accumulation of dedication and tenacity for the craft."

But winners don't rest on their laurels. The Debate Club enters 2-3 international competitions every trimester. After EU-TH in July, the Club will be fielding teams to the 8th United Asians Debating Championship, to be held in Siem Reap, Cambodia from July 28 to August 5. Mr. Sae-Seah said it is "the largest tournament in Asia with over 600 participants from all over the continent competing for the title of 'Asian Champion.'"

Expanding MUIC'S NETWORK of PARTNERS ABROAD

One of the strengths of Mahidol University International College (MUIC) is its very active student exchange program supported by a wide network of university partners in Europe, North and South America, Asia, and Oceania.

Asst. Prof. Dr. Kangwan Yodwisitsak, Associate Dean for International Affairs and Networking, said his mandate upon the start of his term in 2015 included continuously developing exchange links and thus provide MUIC students with a diverse choice of destinations abroad and a variety of educational opportunities beyond student exchange as guided by Mahidol University requirements.

"This means we look for potential partners in all regions and also prefer universities abroad that offer learning opportunities beyond student exchange," he said.

Since October 2015, MUIC has signed new agreements with more than 15 universities, all of which have high rankings by QS World and Times Higher Education (THE).

MUIC recently forged new links with universities in France, UK, the Netherlands, and Germany. It is also currently in talks with high-ranking US universities for potential partnership linkages. The College has been also continuously exploring for potential partners in Asia.

Aside from student exchange, MUIC also aims for other learning opportunities that its partners can provide. One example is **ESB Business School of Reutlingen University** in Germany. Business Administration students can enlist in its internship program which has an extensive network of business establishments in Germany.

Another example is the **School of Hotel and Tourism Management of Hong Kong Polytechnic University** (#95 QS World University Ranking 2018). Not only can MUIC students go on exchange but can also avail of a +1 program wherein THM students can enroll for one academic year and six months of internship. Recent graduates can also enter a dual degree master's program.

With an expanding network of partners abroad, MUIC students are given more opportunities to become global citizens who can confidently compete in the international labor market.

She enrolled in four major courses including Restaurant Management, Revenue Management, Food & Beverage Management, and Hotel Management.

Tang started taking pictures as a hobby eight years ago. "Many people told me to send my work to festivals and contests to get some exposure. I had no idea how big the festivals were until people congratulated me and assured me that they are indeed significant (photography events).

"I love street photography. My main interests are light and shadow. Oftentimes, they change the setting that the subject is in. For instance, when it's noontime in Thailand, sunlight comes straight down from above and anything under a roof-like object like umbrellas, hats, actual roof, becomes completely dark, which is a great way of putting the subject out of space."
