# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Inlike other traditional Southeast Asian kingdoms, Siam/
Thailand was never formally colonized by the West. The
encounter with European imperialism radically altered
Siamese society however. This course looks at how a
multi-ethnic kingdom was transformed into a modern
Thai nation-state in the 19th and 20th centuries. It also
examines a range of pressing political and economic issues
facing the country at present.
